OAK

Look out for strange bumps on oak leaves and twigs. These are 'galls', formed by the tree protecting itself when insects burrow into the leaves to lay their eggs. Insect eggs hatch into wormlike grubs called larvae.

Small galls might only contain a single larva, but larger galls might have as many as thirty!!

ROWAN

Blackbirds love to gorge on the juicy fruit of the rowan tree and can even get tipsy if they eat too many fermented berries!

Birds help with seed dispersal – after eating and digesting the pulp of the fruit, they fly off and poo the seeds out. In this way the seeds are scattered and fertlised.


